History of Economics and Economic Institutions, 6 ECTS, 3-4 quarters, 80 contact hours: lectures (40 hrs), seminars (40 hrs.)

3. Outline

This optional course aims to provide an introduction to the periodization, mechanisms and directions in the development of the world economy as well as its peculiarities and the history of the functioning of economic institutions. It explores economic institutions and business organizations in different countries from a comparative historical perspective and examines the mechanisms of institutional change and their implications for global economic growth. The course also considers the connections between regions and countries in a broad context. Students will analyze the reasons and factors that help define the borders of economic agents, the role of the state, institutions and individuals in economic development. Furthermore, students will learn how practices of interactions between economic units evolve, understand the special features of the integration of economic activities, and examine the interplay between economic development and culture, religion, and politics.
