Digital Marketing and Business

(Master of Science Degree)

The dramatic changes caused by innovations in technology and the expanding global economy have opened up vast opportunities around the world, especially in emerging countries. Starting with well-rounded foundation courses, the newly developed Master's Program in Digital Marketing and Business offers a flexible curriculum that allows students to select a variety of courses from areas covering general business, digital marketing, and entrepreneurship that are paramount for building business careers that are in demand today. These "practicums", a unique element of the program, allow students to get hands-on experience in data analytics or running a business. Under supervision and guidance from faculty, students can put their ideas together in an Honor's Thesis to prepare for advancing to Ph.D. studies, or produce a thesis with research and practical orientation aimed at achieving career goals.

Economics

(Master of Arts and Doctorate Degrees)

The Graduate School of Economics, Tokyo International University (GSE-TIU), aims to train creative experts who have the ingenuity to face diverse policy issues from a global perspective. It also focuses on developing basic research skills that enable students to explore policy challenges in the real economy. Students can hone their analytical skills by pursuing a well-rounded variety of courses in a multicultural environment, paired with individual advisory from TIU faculty that allows for the smooth acquisition of knowledge as well as practical skills relevant to careers in Economics. In addition, through intensive tutorial seminars and joint workshops, students can advance their research to complete an outstanding thesis. TIU also offers the opportunity for students to continue their pursuit of knowledge beyond master's studies to earn a Ph.D., an essential stepping stone for entry into the realm of academia.

International Relations

Overview of the Major:

International Relations is a field of study dealing with how nations with varying power, interest, and identity interact with each other in the absence of a global government. The discipline originated in the tragic experience of World War I, when unprecedented devastation called for a systematic inquiry into the causes of war and conditions for peace. Since then, the range of issues covered in the discipline has expanded to include economic interdependence, international organizations, terrorism, poverty, human rights, and climate change, among others.

International Relations as a discipline is not just about what is happening around the world. We study why countries and national leaders behave the way they do, using different intellectual lenses, called theories. When discussing global issues such as nuclear proliferation, terrorism, refugees, hunger, and global warming, there is no such thing as the "correct answer" that satisfies everyone. The important thing is that you respect different viewpoints and work to find a common ground. Classroom discussions provide valuable opportunities for students with diverse cultural background to present their views and learn from each other. The skills learned are extremely useful not only in the way students approach their daily lives, but also in their future workplace, be it a multinational firm, government, or international organization. The International Relations major is for students who want to contribute to international societies as global citizens.



Teaching enables me to share my enthusiasm for the diversity of International Relations and its intersections with related disciplines. Teaching at TIU is exciting as it brings together students from diverse backgrounds who can share and confront ideas in and beyond the classroom. I want my students to acquire critical thinking skills to understand, challenge, and improve the world around them. I want them to be equipped with life-long skills, such as the ability to express their ideas clearly and convincingly. I rely on interactive lectures, active learning, and discussions as I feel higher education should provide students with opportunities for intellectual empowerment as well as to become curious, strong-minded, and tolerant global citizens. I also integrate cultural productions like films in my courses as gateways to understand the complexities of the global era.

Japanese Language

In standard or intensive programs, students learn Japanese in a small class setting four days a week. Instructors help students with no prior Japanese experience develop fluent Japanese skills by the time they graduate and work to push students who have already studied Japanese to even higher levels of proficiency.

The Japanese Language Institute supports international students in every aspect regarding Japanese language acquisition. There are two major missions about Japanese language education for the JLI: to build communicative ability for students' daily lives, and to prepare them with the business level proficiency required for entering the Japanese workforce. With these goals in mind, the JLI has established a series of tiers to TIU's Japanese language education to ensure that each student is enrolled in the level that is most suited to their individual needs. Currently, there are 20 instructors within the JLI that allow TIU to maintain a small classroom size, as well as catered one-on-one advisory after class when students have free time. It brings us great joy to work together with international students to keep them motivated to study Japanese and eventually make it a common language for life.

Basic Advantages

1 Take more classes, pay the same tuition

Unlike many universities in western countries, tuition at TIU has a flat rate on a semester basis and is not charged per credit. This means you can take up to 20 credits (or 24 depending on your year) for no extra tuition price!

Take courses for your major in Japanese

During your time studying at TIU, if you reach a certain level of Japanese language proficiency, you have the option of taking courses to satisfy your major requirements that are taught in the Japanese language.

3 Change majors after enrollment

Choosing a major is not a lifetime commitment at TIU. If you decide that the major is not the right suit for you after enrolling and wish to tread new ground, you are able to change majors during your study.

4 Take credits from outside of your major

If there is a class that you find interesting outside of your enrolled major, these will be counted as elective credits that will count towards your graduation. If you change majors, these credits will count towards your new major!

TIU's sister school relationship with Willamette University provides students with a number of opportunities to enhance the scope of their university takeaways.

1 Double Degree Program

High achievers have the opportunity to spend 2.5 years at TIU in Japan, then move on to their final 2 years at WU in the United States to earn two bachelor's degrees at the same time in a total of 4.5 years!

2 Atkinson MBA

Willamette University's Atkinson Graduate School of Management is offering TIU graduates the same enrollment and scholarship benefits as their own alumni. This is a great opportunity to plunge into business management after you finish your BE major.

Study Abroad Programs

TIU is one of the only universities in Japan affiliated with ISEP (the International Student Exchange Program), a global organization promoting international exchange for one or two semesters. This program opens up opportunities to study at over 340 of its affiliated universities in over 50 countries around the world - the majority of which are in the USA. More and more TIU students are taking advantage of this affordable opportunity, with popular study destinations being North America, Europe, and Australia. In addition, TIU has special exchange agreements with 21 universities in 13 countries, including double degree opportunities at both Willamette University and Southern Oregon University, USA.

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Career Support

International students have unlimited access to the Career Support Desk, where they can receive one-on-one advising with career specialists. This great resource prepares students for the job hunt with a focus on career development through a variety of events and guidance sessions created to help start students' careers after graduation.



The Career Services Office (CSO) also provides guidance for internships, interview tips and practice, insight into career paths, as well as seminars on important topics to help students succeed in their next chapter in life. In addition, the CSO also invites outside companies for exclusive on-campus company information sessions. These sessions provide students with the opportunity to speak with real employees and learn about the status quo of the workforce.

In order for TIU students to have an accurate impression of the job hunting process, presentations and discussion sessions by guest speakers, including students from other universities who have received job offers, are held throughout the year. With experience and a high track record at the forefront, the Career Services Office support programs which provides tools to TIU E-Track students in order to secure a spot in the current global workforce. These programs have paved the way for international students to achieve a high employment rate.

As a BE student aspiring for a career in Digital Marketing, I realized that in addition to marketing, knowledge and practical experience about coding and IT would be essential for success in this field. Thus, this past spring break I interned at an IT company in Osaka for 6 weeks. The company had other interns as well from many different countries, so whenever I had a question I could ask them or the staff working around me for help! New Courses for Career Development

From 2017, the Career Services Office has added two practical courses to the curriculum in order to prepare students for the global workforce: Career Experience Practicum and How to Succeed at TIU and Beyond.

For two semesters, TIU students taking part in the "Career Experience Practicum" course have the opportunity to work under the mentorship of an external Japanese company's employees. As mentors, the company employees provide students with practical experience on-site and advice on the current working environment. From Fall 2018, TIU will announce a new mentoring company for this course.

Alternatively, students participating in "How to Succeed at TIU and Beyond" learn current business trends and theories as well as create a 4-year plan focusing on job hunting. Students who participated in Spring 2018 applied their knowledge through a one-day internship. Both courses allow students to earn credits and help them excel in their future careers beyond university life.





Affordability


University Fees and Scholarships (Undergraduate)

All students who apply for TIU's English-based degree programs are also eligible to apply for a tuition reduction scholarship. The amount awarded will reduce the overall tuition payments by 30% to 100% for up to 4 years. The amount of scholarship, if awarded, will be announced simultaneously with admission results so students and families can formulate a funding plan prior to enrollment.

Other Scholarships After Enrollment

■ Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO) Scholarship

In order to support international students and help them assimilate to their new home, the Japanese government provides students with an opportunity to apply for a special JASSO scholarship that grants a living stipend of 48,000 yen for 6 months (September enrollment) or 12 months (April enrollment). Due to TIU's great initiative to bolster the international population, virtually all students who applied for this scholarship were successful in 2018.

Cost of Living

Dormitories

In order to foster a safe and comfortable learning environment, TIU operates dormitories in and around campus for students coming to Japan for the first time. Dormitory managers and Residential Assistants are available on-site to lend a hand to international students during the assimilation to their new life in Japan.

■ Renting Apartments in Japan

It is easy to find affordable apartments in the areas surrounding TIU's campuses. The actual monthly rent of apartments differs dramatically based on size and location, though it is realistic to expect to pay between 30,000 and 50,000 yen (\$273 ~ \$455) per month. Students have the option to live alone in a studio apartment, or live together with a friend or classmate in a shared apartment. While most apartments are not furnished, some real estate agencies do have furnished options available at a higher monthly price. Unfurnished apartments may have an air conditioner pre-installed, but other furniture and appliances for daily life like beds, couches, refrigerators, microwaves, and the like must be purchased by tenants on their own. TIU will not find apartments for its students, but the university does have a contracted English speaking agency available to assist students in their search.

■ Monthly Living Costs

As you can imagine, daily habits and overall way of life play a large role in determining how much money is spent per month. However, most students say that they spend on average between 70,000 and 95,000 yen (\$636 ~ \$864) per month on all expenses (including apartment rent, utilities, food, and other bills). As you move closer to the heart of Tokyo, cost of living becomes higher and higher, but there are plenty of affordable and convenient options for TIU students near the campus.

Total Cost of Life at TIU

When taking the factors mentioned above into consideration, we can estimate that the average cost of living and TIU tuition and fees with no scholarship would be roughly 2,290,000 yen (\$20,818) for the first year. Even though Tokyo is widely known as one of the most expensive cities in the world, this is a dramatic miscomprehension. 
Tavishi from India



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Ikebukuro International Campus (2023)

Tokyo International University will be establishing a new Urban International Campus in the Ikebukuro Metropolitan Area where the university's educational globalization efforts will be centralized. The English Track Program as well as other educational globalization functions will be centralized in this new campus. The university is planning to relocate half of the student body (roughly 3,500 of 7,000 students), and amongst those 3,500 students, the aim is 2,000 international students from over 100 countries. The addition of IT Business courses is a huge initiative for TIU to reach this ambitious goal. This new campus will dramatically strengthen the foundation of the globalized education already present in TIU, as well as bolster the overall globalization of the Ikebukuro Metropolitan Area.
